## Open House Dates

Open house dates for 2017-2018 are:

These events will both begin at 6:30 p.m. Please park in either the east or west lot. On this evening, parents/guardians will attend two days worth of classes. We will go to 1-4 red followed by 1-4 green. On this evening we will not attend your child's advisory class. The event will conclude around 8:30 p.m. Parents/guardians will have time off during your child's normal "split" class time. The P.T.O. may have school clothing for sale.

## First U.I.L. Eligibility Deadline for Participation - September 22, 2017

The first University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.) deadline is **September 22nd**. Texas students must pass all classes on this date and additionally at each nine weeks mark to be eligible to participate in contests, performances, Science Fair, games, etc. This includes passing all classes that are for high school credit as well as those that are Pre-AP. The complete listing of U.I.L. eligibility dates is available at our website. Note students who are not passing a course on September 22nd actually lose their eligibility to participate in contests on **September 29th at 3:55 p.m.** At our website, parents/guardians and students can access, print, and/or bookmark the file titled "UIL Eligibility Dates 17-18" for a complete overview of all eligibility changes as well as progress report dates. Note, Texas students who are ineligible are prohibited from riding the bus with the team, being on the field/stage/bench during an event, or participating in any way during contests according to U.I.L. rules.

## KIDCHAT Anonymous Tipline 1-888-KIDCHAT

Our campus and district have an anonymous tipline that can be accessed 24 hours a day by contacting 1-888-KIDCHAT. Information can be communicated at this site regarding activity that is illegal or inappropriate occurring both in the community or on a school campus. Students play a key role in helping keep the school and community safe. Reports are followed up upon by school administrators and/or police. In some cases, informants may qualify for a monetary reward for information leading to felony arrests.

**Free Parent and Student Access Center** - Parents and guardians have free access to Parent Access Center via [www.conroeisd.net](http://www.conroeisd.net). This portal gives complete access to student grades, attendance, tardies, discipline, STAAR scores, and other information. This tool can also give parents and guardians the opportunity to set thresholds where you will be emailed scores of each assignment. Students also have the same access via **Student Access Center**.

## P.T.O. Meeting - September 21st at 9:30 a.m.

Our first P.T.O. meeting of the year will occur on September 21st at 9:30 a.m. The gathering will occur in the Nancy Bock Auditorium at 9:30 a.m. Mr. Marc Brumberger, Chief of the Juvenile Division of the Montgomery County Attorney's Office, will be our speaker. Mr. Brumberger is also a McCullough parent and will bring attention to the major concerns, trends, and dangers facing students today. He will provide information our parents need to be aware of in order to put our children in the best possible position to have success and avoid the legal pitfalls that impact youth everywhere.

## Knowing Where Your Child is After School

### Helping Eliminate Stress of Locating Your Son or Daughter After School Dismisses

When you are a parent/guardian, seeing your child come home from school is an exciting time. Our goal is to ensure your child comes home each and every day at the time you expect and through the method you anticipate. We care and want to ensure everyone is reunited appropriately. However, at dismissal in secondary schools across the country, students choose their own path coordinated with parents/guardians to arrive home whether it be by bus, bike, car, or walking. Every day we have over 2200 children arrive home just as the plan was meant to be. On an occasional basis we have a situation where a child chose an alternative plan on his/her own after school without alerting a parent or guardian. Please echo the suggestions we make to students to help ensure your child notifies a parent or guardian if the child unilaterally decides to change his/her plans. We have a phone available for free use by students in the front office all day, every day until 6:00 p.m. Our office stays open late over an hour after school is out until 5:00 p.m. with Ms. Villarreal as our receptionist to assist. There are many dangers associated with students having cell phones and by no means are they required. However, late in the afternoon or early in the evening cell phones are a great tool to find your child when otherwise it may be next to impossible for anyone, including a parent, police, or us. Also, some devices have the ability to be located by a parent or guardian to narrow down the location of the phone and presumably the child.

**Early Checkout Specifics to Help**

If you are checking your child out early during the school day, it will be far quicker if the student brings a note to the front desk before school with your clear directions on what time he/she should be waiting for you in the front office. Please note, this is even more important if the child is in athletics or physical education as it can take much longer to locate them and have them in the front office if they are picked up without an advance note. A form is available on our website for use to help make the process faster. This document is located in our parent services area titled "early release request form." Additional forms are available as needed at the front desk. *Please note a parent or guardian must come into the building to check a student out.* For student safety, please note in advance a photo I.D. is required to check out your child.

**Parking Lot Safety and Speed Limit**

The posted speed limit in our lots is 5 mph. For the safety of all, please note the posting.

**Bicycle Safety**

If your child is riding a bike, our bicycle rack is on the west side by the football field. This area is under video surveillance and is close to the west doors in case of rain. Please remind your child to please make certain he/she does not ride through the parking lot. The setup is such that the rider can ride through the grass and bypass normal parking lot traffic. *If you operate a vehicle in our parking lot, please be cognizant of all bicycle, car, and foot traffic.* The first week of school we met with all students to discuss bike safety and expectations within that meeting.

**Riding Home on an Alternate Bus in an Emergency**

Students may be allowed to ride home on an alternate bus in the event of an *emergency*. However, there are a number of action items students/parents/guardians need to know in advance to ensure a student can and does secure the appropriate transportation home at the end of the day. These include:

- some buses are operating daily at maximum capacity and *cannot* take extra riders
- to ride home on an alternate bus with a friend, a note from a parent or guardian is required including the full name of your child, alternate bus your child needs to ride, parent/guardian phone number, and parent/guardian signature
- a contact number where you can be reached to potentially verify
- the request form with the parent signature and contact number must be submitted to the grade level office by noon for verification

**Afternoon Front Office Pick Up**

If you plan to enter the front office for any business after 3:00, you must park in either the west football field side main lot or the west side of the front horseshoe if space is available. There will be no "unattended parking" on the east or first half of the horseshoe after 3:00 p.m. due to the after school pick up line. Signs will be posted designating the east horseshoe area as a no parking zone after 3:00 p.m. Parking correctly will keep your vehicle from being blocked in by the car rider pick up line. The line which builds for afternoon pick up will need to form along the right curb so that emergency traffic can enter if needed.

**Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs)**

Please note our campus now has four automated external defibrillators for use if ever needed. These reside by the clinic, in the field-house, by the gym, and on the upstairs mezzanine.

Each year our P.T.O. hosts a number of meetings for parents where we have quality speakers to address important issues for our parents, guardians, and students. Our tentative meetings for 2017-2018 will occur on September 21st, January 18th, and April 19th.

**Student Emotional Health Helping our Children Be Their Best**

Our counselors, administration, and staff care deeply about the emotional health of our students. Teenagers undergo a lot of stress due to expectations both real and perceived. We work hard to counsel and encourage students who need emotional guidance. If you have a child you are concerned about, please contact our counseling staff to update them as needed. When we have concerns we will work hard to let you know also. If your child has a concern about another individual, please encourage them to let one of our counselors know so that we can be aware and assist.

**State Student Success Initiative (SSI) Information****A Gentle Reminder that Eighth Grade Students Must Pass the State Reading and Math STAAR Exams in Order to Advance to Ninth Grade**

As a reminder, Texas students currently in eighth grade are required by the state Student Success Initiative (SSI) law to pass the eighth grade STAAR math and reading exams to advance to ninth grade. Eighth grade students will have three opportunities to take these exams, with two tests for each subject, coming in the school year and one each in the summer if necessary. Summer STAAR testing will occur in late June if necessary and students who do not pass the exams on the second administration are required by the state to attend summer STAAR Academy. Our goal is to support each child to help him/her do their best and pass the first time. If you have a child in eighth grade, please note this state law before making any firm decisions regarding out of town summer vacations.

**Ongoing Bullying Prevention**

The first week of school administrators meet with students through language arts classes to discuss school procedures, expectations, and where to go for help with any need. A wide range of topics are covered including the student handbook. One aspect of this is bullying prevention. If your child is bullied or perceives he/she is bullied at school, please have your student contact his/her administrator in the grade level offices. Email addresses for our assistant principal staff are available on our website. We want to help. Letting the appropriate assistant principal know, so that he/she can investigate, is key.

**Tentative Student Pep Rally Dates and Details**

McCullough is tentatively set for student pep rallies on 9/19, 10/10, and 11/7. **Note, these are pep rallies for students** and each gathering will begin at 8:00 a.m. sharp and conclude around 8:32 a.m. There is a designated area for parents/guardians to sit for the pep rally, provided all children have a seat. Expect heavy traffic on the west side leading up to the pep rally start time. Entry is exclusively through the main brown west patio doors on the football field side of the building. Thanks in advance to all of the students and sponsors for their hard work in making our pep rallies possible.

### Bus Accidents and Breakdowns What to Know in Advance of a Delay

Our buses do a great job each day of driving our students safely to and from home and school. To put it in perspective, in a given week CISD buses drive further than the distance from Earth to the Moon! With these miles comes the inevitability of minor bus wrecks or breakdowns. It is a rarity, but it does happen. Most students have phones now to keep you updated. Please note in advance we will attempt to send you email updates if we can based on the situations and if we have updated information. The preferred method of getting the child home after an incident is by the bus or a replacement bus. Please be aware if you do appear on the scene we cannot release students to parents or guardians until we get the go ahead from the police who are working the accident. Thanks for your understanding and cooperation in advance.

### Electronics and Phones - Expectations, Pros, Cons, Rules, and Considerations for Parents/Guardians to Know

Students are allowed to bring electronics to school as long as they are off between 8:50 a.m. and 3:55 p.m. This includes lunch. Your assistance in helping them understand that vibrate is not off is appreciated. For student safety and privacy, electronics are never allowed to be out or on while in the locker room or bathroom. School and felony legal consequences will potentially occur for phone/camera use in areas of which there is a legal expectation of privacy. These items, including phones, are immensely popular among young people. However, due to the fact that these are high theft items on all campuses, it is highly recommended parents/guardians consider whether their child is mature enough to keep up with these very expensive devices. The amount of smartphones left by users on tables, benches, and in the hallways is *staggering*. These items are brought at the student's own risk. Note in advance that if a student's use of electronics, including phones, violates policy, the device will be taken up and consequences for the inappropriate use will be assigned. The phone may need to be picked up by a parent or guardian depending on the infraction and overall number of violations and may not be returned to the student on the same day. Please do not ask your child to have his/her phone on so that you can text or call them, potentially disrupting instruction of children. If you need to get information to your child, please call 832-592-5100 as we deliver messages directly to students throughout the school day. Experience also shows that your child having a phone is incredibly valuable when trying to locate them after the end of the school day.

### Bus Safety and Student Transportation Behavior Expectations

Now that school is underway, I want to take a moment to address a very important issue regarding bus safety and behavioral expectations of students. Our students, and by default your children, are the most important thing and the reason as a school we exist. Many of you count on bus transportation to successfully transport your child to and from campus each day. The drivers do a great job and are some of the most patient and caring people among us. A statistic that is amazing is C.I.S.D. drivers, in one week, drive further than the distance between the Earth and the Moon largely without incident. As a campus we are serious and committed to making the ride to and from school a great one for each child. Our campus is not in charge of transportation. However, we do work collaboratively with transportation, students, drivers, and parents/guardians to make the trip the best it can be. Being on the bus is a different environment for students and one most handle wonderfully. However, for some, this is more of a challenge. We will communicate with each student, in person, what is expected on the buses the first week of school. The safety and civility of all in this higher risk area is a top priority. Because we want all to enjoy an uneventful and happy ride home, please take a moment to stress the following with your child:

- \*Any unsafe behavior can be reported at any time to an administrator. Please encourage your child to not wait to report a concern or assume another student will report it.
- \*Concerns about actions on a bus can always be submitted anonymously to 1-888-KIDCHAT.
- \*Students can board or depart buses only at their designated bus stop.
- \*Drivers may assign seats on the school bus. In this case students are required to sit in these designated areas.
- \*Departing through the back bus door is only permissible during an emergency.
- \*For additional student safety, most buses have one or more video cameras operating. Most of these now include audio recording for additional student assistance when needed.
- \*The bus stop is considered school property. Any inappropriate action occurring at a school bus stop is the same as if it occurs on campus.
- \*Consequences will be assigned for failure to follow bus guidelines and meet safety expectations. These consequences include normal campus discipline, temporary removal from the bus, and permanent loss of transportation privileges.

### Subject: Important U.I.L. Competition Information for Parents/Guardians/Students

- \* Periodically, contests may be canceled or delayed due to lightning. When a lightning strike occurs within a ten mile radius we are required to wait 30 minutes before resuming the outside event. If we delay a game due to lightning, please evacuate the stands and return to your vehicle or the safety of our building. We want to play but the safety of our students and fans always comes first.
  - \* Any contest short of varsity is not made up, replayed, or rescheduled.
  - \* We have no control over the delay or cancellation of a contest at an opposing school where we are not the home team.
  - \* If a game is canceled early due to conditions that clearly dictate it is unplayable we will attempt to email you. This is a rarity for outside events. We always make an effort to play the contest. A call on playing, delaying, or canceling the game may not be made until game time or even after the scheduled start depending on developing conditions. The best way to know the ever changing status of an event is to follow our campus Twitter feed @mcculloughcis. Additionally, many activities have their own Twitter feeds they update with information.
  - \* If you have family or friends flying in from afar to see a child play, your assistance in ensuring they understand the lightning policy and exactly which team they are on is helpful.
  - \* Entry fees at Conroe I.S.D. junior high events remain only two dollars for adults and one dollar for students. Please note, when we are the visiting team at other school districts entry fees may be much more. Tournament fees are considerably higher.
  - \* If you are a fine art or athletic parent/guardian attending a game involving our home stadium sunglasses are highly recommended.
  - \* U.I.L. academic eligibility is real. Please note students in Texas have to pass all of their courses at the end of the first six weeks and every subsequent nine weeks to remain eligible for games, contests, concerts, plays, and other competitions. The complete calendar of U.I.L. eligibility dates can be accessed on the front page of our website.
  - \* Note the first grading period for the U.I.L. concludes on September 22nd. By law, the first marking period is only six weeks. This means grades that determine eligibility are compiled statewide from a smaller total number due to the limited number of days involved. Translated this means each grade has more impact than over the normal nine weeks period for a grade. Students need to understand that overall averages can change wildly, either way, pending exams that are taken leading up the September 29th date a Texas student could lose eligibility.

### Social Media Information All Parents/Guardians Need to Be Aware of to Help Ensure Children are Happy, Healthy, and Safe

The information below is **very important** if you are the parent or guardian of a child who has access to the internet via phone, your home, or at a friend's house. Our goal is to help ensure all of our children are happy, healthy, and safe. The information below is being shared because social media pitfalls committed off campus are negatively overtaking the lives of our students, and much of what we do administratively each day on campus. We want to inform, help, and assist in preventing family stress as much as possible.

Overall, the vast majority of our students do a *great job* of using social media each and every day at home or at school. It is a great way for students to stay connected and most handle it maturely and appropriately. Some students have a more difficult time using this mode of communication in a correct and well, legal, way.

No school has control over student social media accounts or the internet. We have no ability to delete the social media accounts of individual students including their Instagram, Snapchat, Vine, Twitter, or any other platform. We can enact school consequences if an inappropriate posting occurs on campus. Depending on the situation, criminal charges may be **and routinely are filed by the county** and if you believe threatening online postings have occurred the Montgomery County Sheriff's Department has jurisdiction.

**This sounds simple, but the single best way for your child not to receive negative posts or be involved with potential online bullying is for them to not have a social media account.** We realize that is not popular or probable. Furthermore, if as a parent/guardian, you want to ensure your child is not involved in online bullying on either end, it is important to have access to their *real* social media accounts and the private area of each. These accounts often look very different once you enter the *private* realm reserved only for those *invited* to the account. Often times the public area is purposefully misleading or mundane.

Our assistant principals are happy to help if we can should an outside of school bullying situation exist. This is something we do routinely to help children. Please note in advance we have no jurisdiction to impose consequences for actions occurring outside of school.

Young people live much of their lives through these virtual worlds. It cannot be overstated how important phones and social networks are to teenagers in the U.S., nor can it be overemphasized how many problems they create for schools, including McCullough Junior High. This also includes problems created indirectly for parents and guardians.

It would be naïve to fail to mention the cheating aspects of the social media accounts. Our campus works hard to maintain test security to ensure exams are fair for all. Numerous accounts exist online created by students to share information. We work diligently to minimize or eliminate this the best we can with the social media providers.

Compared to almost every other campus in the country, we have almost non-existent fights in school. It would be incorrect to say it never happens but some years we have next to none. Our staff and administration go to *exhaustive* lengths to intervene, counsel, and do everything possible to *prevent* these. Our students do a wonderful job of providing tips to assist. **When we do have conflicts in almost every instance the catalyst for it involved social media.** If you have concerns about a potential situation we constantly encourage our students to call the C.I.S.D. anonymous tipline at 1-888-KIDCHAT. Our goal is to prevent problems. Each year our administration meets with the kids in person the first week of school. During that meeting it is emphasized that students can come at any time to any staff member with a concern.

On a somewhat related subject, note almost daily there are faux accounts that are created to mimic legitimate school, individual, or district websites. We have not been immune to this. Additionally, many students create faux accounts to confuse or mislead parents and guardians. It happens constantly. Our campus maintains a social media presence on Twitter @mcculloughcisid and on Facebook @mcculloughjhcisd. These are the only official and real social media accounts we have as a campus. From this account we will relay timely campus information, post pictures of students who have experienced success, relay information for TWHS feeder, and retweet alumni stories. I encourage you to follow these accounts for detailed information on our campus far beyond what you will receive via email or newsletter. Thank you for taking the time to read this. It is a great day and age to be a young person. Our goal is to help you make it the best life possible for your child. We care.

Please note teachers do check papers for authenticity and plagiarism via online verification resources.

#### Information Designed to Protect and Inform Use of Photo and Video in Areas of Which There is a Legal Expectation of Privacy What Every Parent/Guardian and Student Needs to Know

Our campus cares deeply about all of our students and works very hard to educate and protect them. Across the country the ubiquitous presence of smartphone technology in the hands of young people presents the opportunity for our students, your children, to suffer serious and potentially lifelong consequences as an offender and/or a victim. Issues associated with students taking/sending improper pictures or recordings continue to dominate both local, state, and national news. Our goal is to keep all students safe and free from harm caused by inappropriate phone/camera use. To protect your child, our campus strongly recommends that you, as a parent or guardian, share with your child the below information about several Texas laws that apply to this issue. Signs are posted throughout our building reiterating these laws. This includes but is not limited to locker rooms and bathrooms. We will meet with students the first week of the new school year to cover a number of major issues, including these laws. Students who break the law are subject to prosecution and arrest by county authorities. Depending on the situation and place of occurrence, students are also subject to school consequences for inappropriate recordings or transmission of images.

#### **INVASIVE VISUAL RECORDING**

Photographing or videotaping another person in an area where the person being recorded expects privacy (like a bathroom or locker room) or, when a person electronically **sends a photo or video that shows someone in an area that is expected to be private IS a crime.** Nudity does not have to be depicted in the photo or video for this to be a crime. *Texas Penal Code §21.15*

#### **ELECTRONIC TRANSMISSION OF CERTAIN VISUAL MATERIAL DEPICTING MINOR**

Electronically sending pictures or video that shows minors in sexual conduct, including nudity, or being in possession of these material can be a criminal offense. *Texas Penal Code §43.621*
